To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas, William Teers, of Pickens County, —

has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Tuscaloosa,

whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said William Teers, —

according to the provisions of the act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for

the West half of the South East quarter of section twenty three, in Township twenty two, of range thirteen

West in the District of Land subject to sale at Tuscaloosa, Alabama; containing eighty acres and six hundredths
of an acre, according to the official plat of the survey of the said Lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been purchased by the said William Teers.

NOW KNOW YE, That the **UNITED STATES OF AMERICA**, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and, by these presents, do give and grant, unto the said William Teers, —

and to his heirs, the said tract above described: To

Have and to Hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities and appurtenances, of whatsoever nature thereunto belonging, unto the said William Teers, —

and to his heirs and assigns forever.

PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, have caused these Letters to be made Patent, and the Seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.
