To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas, Charles Pate of Tuscaloosa County

has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Tuscaloosa  
whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said Charles Pate

according to the provisions of the act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for  
The East Half of the South West Quarter of Section Thirteen in Township Twenty Two, of Range Thirteen West, in the District  
of Lands, Subject to sale at Tuscaloosa Alabama, Containing Eighty Acres, and Seven Hundredths of an Acre

according to the official plat of the survey of the said Lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been pur-  
chased by the said Charles Pate

NOW KNOW YE, That the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the  
several acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and, by these presents, do give and grant, unto the said Charles Pate  
and to his heirs, the said tract above described: To

Have and to Hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities and appurtenances, of whatsoever nature thereunto belonging, unto the said Charles  
Pate and to his heirs and assigns forever.

PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, have caused these Letters to be made Patent, and the Seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto  
affixed.
