Act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for the South East quarter of the South East quarter of Section twenty eight and fraction "A" of Section thirty three, in Township twenty two of Range thirteen West, in the district of lands subject to sale at Tuscaloosa Alabama, containing eight six acres and thirty two and a quarter hundredths of an acre.

according to the official plat of the Survey of the said Lands, returned to the General Land Office by the SURVEYOR GENERAL, which said tract has been purchased by the said Joseph Tate.

and to his heirs, the said tract above described: To have and to hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances, of whatsoever nature, thereunto belonging, unto the said Joseph Tate

and to his heirs and assigns forever.
