To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas George W. Hill, of Greene County
 has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Tuscaloosa
 whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said George W. Hill,
 according to the provisions of the act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for
 the East half of the South east quarter of section eighteen, in township twenty three, of Range One West, in the district of land
 subject to sale at Tuscaloosa, Alabama, containing eighty acres, and eighty six hundredths of an acre
 according to the official plan of the survey of the said lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been pur-
 chased by the said George W. Hill.

NOW KNOW YE, That the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the
 several acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and by these presents do give and grant, unto the said

 To have and to hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances of whatsoever nature, thereunto belonging, unto the said
 George W. Hill,
 and to his heirs, the said tract above described.
 and to his heirs and assigns forever.
