To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas, Robert Lavender of Pickens County
 has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Tuscaloosa
 whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said Robert Lavender
 according to the provisions of the Act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for
 the West half of the North West quarter of section Twenty-four in Township twenty-four
 of Range one East, in the district of lands offered for sale at Tuscaloosa, Alabama,
 containing eighty acres and six hundredths of an acre,
 according to the official plat of the survey of the said lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been pur-
 chased by the said Robert Lavender

NOW KNOW YE, That the **UNITED STATES OF AMERICA**, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several
 acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have Given and Granted, and, by these presents do give and grant, unto the said Robert Lavender
 and to his heirs the said tract above described: To Have and to Hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities and appur-
 tenances, of whatsoever nature thereto belonging, unto the said Robert Lavender
 and to his heirs and assigns forever.

PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto
 affixed.
