Whereas,

William Mc Cracken of Pickens County
has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at *Tuscaloosa*
whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said *William Mc Cracken*
according to the provisions of the act of Congress of the 24th April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for
The east half of the south east quarter of Section Twenty Three in Township Twenty four of Range
One East in the District of lands subject to sale at Tuscaloosa Alabama containing eighty
acres and six hundredths of an acre
according to the official plat of the survey of the said Lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been purchased by the said *William Mc Cracken*

NOW KNOW YE, That the **UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,** in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and, by these presents, do give and grant, unto the said *William Mc Cracken* and to *his* heirs, the said tract above described:
To Have and to Hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities and appurtenances, of whatsoever nature thereunto belonging, unto the said *William Mc Cracken* and to *his* heirs and assigns forever.
