To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas, William A. Morrow, of Pickens county,
has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Tuskegee,
whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said William A. Morrow,
according to the provisions of the Act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for
the East half of the North-east quarter of section nineteen, in Township twenty-four of Range two East, in
the district of lands offered for sale at Tuskegee, Alabama, containing seventy-nine acres, and eighty-five
hundredths of an acre,
according to the official plat of the survey of the said Lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been pur-
chased by the said William A. Morrow.

NOW KNOW YE, That the **UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,** in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several
acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have Given and Granted, and, by these presents, do give and grant, unto the said William A. Morrow,
and to his heirs,
the said tract above described: To Have and to Hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities and appur-
tenances, of whatsoever nature thereto belonging, unto the said William A. Morrow,
and to his heirs and assigns forever.

In testimony whereof, I, John Quincy Adams,
PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto
affixed.

fifty-first.
