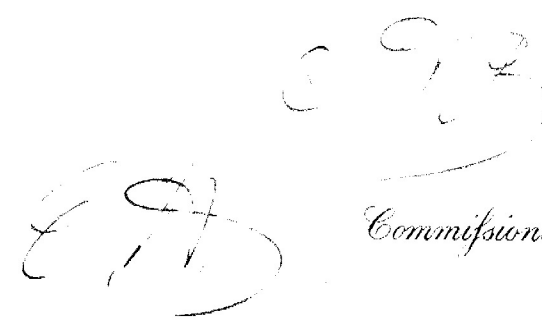
To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas, James M. Cracken, of Pickens county,
has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Tuscaloosa,
whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said James M. Cracken,
according to the provisions of the act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for
the East half of the North-West quarter of Section eighteen, in Township twenty-four, of
Range two, East, in the district of lands offered for sale at Tuscaloosa, Alabama, con-
taining seventy-nine acres, and seventy-seven hundredths of an acre,
according to the official plat of the survey of the said Lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been pur-
chased by the said James M. Cracken.

NOW KNOW YE, That the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several
acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and, by these presents, do give and grant, unto the said James M. Cracken,
and to his heirs, the said tract above described: To
Have and to Hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities and appurtenances, of whatsoever nature thereunto belonging, unto the said James
M. Cracken,
and to his heirs and assigns forever

affixed.
