Whereas William Courson of Pickens County
has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Tuscaloosa
whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said William ~~Pickens~~ Courson
according to the provisions of the act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for

To have and to hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances of whatsoever nature, thereunto belonging, unto the said
William Courson
and to his heirs and assigns forever.
